

# WHO WE ARE:

The Marshall Legacy Institute (MLI) is a Virginia-based 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization that was founded by General Gordon R. Sullivan (Ret.) in 1997 to extend the vision of Nobel Peace Prize laureate George C. Marshall and the Marshall Plan, which was designed to alleviate suffering and promote hope, growth, and stability in war-torn countries. For many nations, a primary obstacle to achieving sustainable progress is the deadly legacy of landmines and other unexploded ordnance, relics of armed conflicts that often ended long ago. Landmines cause long-lasting environmental degradation, halt agricultural production, impede economic growth, slow the return of refugees, instill fear, and kill and maim innocent people and animals daily.

MLI's primary mission is to establish practical, affordable, and sustainable indigenous programs to help severely mine-affected countries rid their land of the horrific scourge of landmines. These efforts include the development and implementation of the Mine Detection Dog Partnership Program (MDDPP), which provides mine detection dogs (MDDs) to accelerate the pace of landmine clearance operations; the CHildren Against Mines Program (CHAMPS), which promotes global citizenship and engages American youth in service learning projects to help children living in war-torn countries; and the Survivors' Assistance program, which helps those injured by landmines acquire prostheses and attend vocational training for a swift reintegration into the community.

These three programs (1) educate citizens about the dangers of mines, (2) provide valuable resources for landmine clearance, especially MDDs, (3) train national leaders charged with mine-action responsibilities, and (4) assist landmine survivors with physical and psychological needs. MLI provides resources and training to help countries build their own sustainable demining programs.

For the past 17 years, MLI has strived to assist severely mine contaminated countries by helping themselves. MLI is a strong advocate for affordable sustainable programs.

## By the end of 2014,

#### MLI had...

- 1) provided 198 mine detection dogs to 11 wartorn countries and trained and certified indigenous handlers to safely employ the dog teams in national landmine clearance programs;
- 2) engaged tens of thousands of youth from America and abroad, in the global landmine issue;
- 3) and provided critically needed medical assistance, prostheses, mobility devices, and vocational training to hundreds of landmine survivors.


# **MDDPP**

MLI's longest running program is the **Partnership** Detection Dog (MDDPP). **Program** The program private utilizes aovernment and donations to purchase, train, and deliver Mine Detection Dogs (MDDs) to indigenous demining organizations within a mine-affected country. There are currently more than 900 MDDs working in 24 countries; MLI has donated nearly 200 of those dogs. In just the past two years, MLI's lifesaving dogs have searched more than 6 million square meters of minecontaminated land, saving countless lives!


MDDs are a crucial component to mine action programs because of their incredible sense of smell, which

"sniff out" allows them to landmines. explosive odors of Unlike metal detectors. commonly used in demining, a dog is able to locate both metal and plastic landmines. An MDD works in a team with a human handler; the team can search up to 30 times manual faster than а deminer without compromising accuracy.

When properly integrated with other technologies (manual demining and machines) the mine detection dog team is an incredibly valuable tool for mine detection. None of MLI's Mine Detection Dogs have ever been hurt or killed while working.



# **MDD Breakdown**





# MDD's Donated by MLI as of December 2014


# Active MDDs in each country as of December 2014

# **CHAMPS**

Through the Children Against Mines Program (CHAMPS), MLI delivers landmine presentations and demonstrations to schoolchildren throughout the U.S., inspiring American children to not only explore the global landmine problem, but to also become part of the solution. CHAMPS elevates awareness about landmines, promotes global citizenship, and raises funds to sponsor life-saving MDDs and to help youth who have been wounded by landmines. As of December 2014, dedicated CHAMPS youth raised nearly 1 million dollars, sponsoring 33 mine detection dogs (MDDs) and helping hundreds of landmine survivors.

Through CHAMPS, children in mine-affected countries receive extensive mine risk education, which they share with their peers in other neighboring mine-affected communities, raising awareness about how to avoid landmines.

# Survivors' Assistance

Unfortunately, there are hundreds of thousands of people who have been injured by landmines, approximately 5,000 additional men. women, and children are hurt by these deadly weapons each year. Therefore, MLI's Survivors' Assistance Program began as a way to implement a variety of programs that assist those who have been injured by mines. MLI provides prosthetic devices. rehabilitative treatments. and vocational training to hundreds of landmine survivors each year.


2014, hundreds of landmine survivors from Iraq, Lebanon, and Yemen received medical care and vocational trainin. In Iraq, 21 survivors from Baghdad and Basra received prosthetic limbs, and an additional 5,300 Iragis received mine risk education. In Yemen, ten landmine survivors received prosthetic limbs and other medical care. and additional 20 survivors were given vocational training. MLI's Survivors' **Assistance** program in Lebanon provided vocational training medical care to 75 survivors. MLI has helped change lives in Afghanistan, Armenia, Azerbaijan, **Bosnia** Herzegovina, Iraq, Lebanon, Vietnam, and Yemen.

# Work in Afghanistan

Hundreds of thousands of landmines remain active throughout Afghanistan. Each month, mine explosions maim and kill hundreds of innocent people, and only one in four of these victims can afford the necessary medical care.

Since 2007, MLI has donated 28 mine detection dogs (MDDs) to four Afghan demining organizations: the Demining Agency for Afghanistan (DAFA), the Mine Clearance Planning Agency (MCPA), the Organization for Mine Clearance and Afghan Rehabilitation (OMAR), and the Afghan Technical Consultants (ATC). In 2014, these dogs searched 1,389,099 or just over 343 acres of land, which directly affected several thousand Afghan citizens. The reclaimed land is now used for cultivation, grazing, and residential purposes.

After removing buried landmines last year from communities in the Central Logar Province, DAFA interviewed several people from the

Deh-e-Payan village of Khoshi whose lives had greatly changed because of the mine clearance operations in their villages.

When asked what difference mine clearance operations have made in their village, a Community Leader responded that, "Mines created a lot of problems for our daily activities. We were unable to cultivate our wasted lands, graze our animals, gather fire wood, and we were worried when our children played around the contaminated areas." Ghulum was then asked how his life will change now that the land is free of mines. "We are able to cultivate our lands, graze our animals, and our children are safe when they walk to school or play outside."



# Work in Azerbaijan

Azerbaijan's landscape is contaminated with landmines for hundreds of square kilometers along the border of Nagorno-Karabakh.

MLI has partnered with the Azerbaijan National Agency for Mine Action (ANAMA) since 2005 to assist in clearing the land of mines. As of 2014, MLI had donated 29 Mine Detection Dogs (MDDs) to ANAMA. Since MDDs work 6-8 years before being retired, currently there are 15 MDDs that are still actively working, while the rest have been retired to live with their handlers. The actively working MDDs, including: Alma, Dexter, Donohue, Marcos, Mojca, Brownie, Guru, Gaga, Gavran, Beti, Elke, Rocket, Mace, Kora, and Roki are responsible for searching a remarkable 1,708,617 m² (422 acres) of land primarily in the Fizuli District. In 2015, MLI plans to donate additional mine detection dogs to ANAMA to replace retiring dogs and to ensure that their excellent demining work can continue at the same impressive pace.

# Work in Bosnia and Herzegovina

Nineteen years after the war, Bosnia and Herzegovina (BiH) remains the most mine-contaminated country in Europe. Though much has been done to help BiH recover, mines and explosive remnants of war continue to have a significant impact on society, inhibiting social, economic, and agricultural development. In just the first six months of 2014, five separate mine incidents had already taken many innocent lives, including two children.

Currently, mines threaten more than 900,000 people in 1,600 communities throughout the country, affecting agricultural production, impeding economic growth, and instilling fear.

MLI has partnered with the U.S. State Department, the Mine Detection Dog Center, and a number of other organizations to implement a variety of projects and events to assist BiH in its demining efforts, and to help the country recover from historic floods in May 2014.

MLI has donated 29 Mine Detection Dogs (MDDs) over the past ten years, including three additional MDDs in 2014: MDDs Jason, Rachel, and Oggie. In

addition, MLI held a major fundraiser event at the Embassy of BiH in Washington, DC in September 2014 to raise funds to demine the area surrounding the town of Maglaj, which was heavily impacted by the floods and landslides. The event also raised funds to assist landmine survivors and provide mine risk education to those living in flood-affected communities, where mines were dislodged from marked minefields and posed an even greater risk to the community. The event raised more than \$100,000, and a ribbon cutting ceremony in Maglaj is planned for May 2015.

Towards the end of 2014, MLI initiated a CHAMPS project in BiH, connecting schools in the U.S. with three schools in Bosnia. The program is not only teaching students mine risk education, and engage them in service learning projects that help mine survivors, but will also addresses interethnic reconciliation in BiH by linking ethnic majority Serb, Croat, and Bosniak students and enabling them to interact, learn about each other, and become friends. MLI is pleased to be partnering with the MDDC and the U.S. State Dept. to implement this important program that targets youth and promotes peace among the ethnic groups in BiH.

# Work in Iraq and Kurdistan

Landmines and unexploded ordnance (UXO) litter Iraq as a result of multiple conflicts over the past 30 years, affecting more than 1.6 million people and 1,730 square kilometers.

MLI has been working in Iraq and Kurdistan since 2008, providing mine detection dogs, helping mine survivors, and engaging Iraqi and American youth in the mine issue. In 2014, American school children from 6 schools in Pennsylvania, Connecticut, and Maryland held 20 video conference calls with students from 5 schools in Basra, Baghdad, and Wassit. Iraqi students described the dangers of living around minefields and the American students discussed their eagerness to help their new friends.

The fundraising efforts of American school children helped 21 landmine survivors by providing them with prosthetic limbs and rehabilitative treatment.

In addition to providing medical assistance to mine survivors, MLI provided Mine Risk Education (MRE) to 5,300 Iraqis living in heavily mine contaminated areas.

In addition to MLI's CHAMPS and Survivors' Assistance programs, MLI has been providing Mine Detection Dogs to Iraq since 2008. In that time, MLI has since




donated eighteen of these lifesaving dogs to the Iraqi Mine & UXO Clearance Organization (IMCO), working in southern Iraq, and the Mines Advisory Group (MAG), working in Kurdistan.

Though four of the dogs have now retired to live with their handlers, the 14 active MDDs searched 362,003 m2 (89 acres) in 2014, saving thousands of lives and returning the land to the people.

# Work in Lebanon

Lebanon is contaminated with landmines and Unexploded Ordnance (UXO) as a result of a fifteen year-long civil war and ongoing conflicts with neighboring countries. While over 90 square kilometers of land are still contaminated, MLI is helping the Lebanese Mine Action Center (LMAC) free its land of mines and other explosive remnants of war.

Since 2001, MLI has donated 27 life-saving Mine Detection Dogs to "sniff out" landmines and save lives. In 2014, because several of LMAC's MDDs were retired, MLI donated three new dogs to help the LMAC continue with its great demining work. Despite often difficult working conditions, the 17 actively working dog teams searched 53,050m2 (13 acres) of mine-affected land, locating nearly 50 buried mines.

MLI's Survivors' Assistance Program in Lebanon was also active in 2014, directly helping 75 Lebanese mine survivors by providing them with critically needed medical assistance and vocational training. The individuals who were selected were living in very poor conditions and

had not received any treatment in the past five years.

The survivors also received vocational training in poultry raising and tree cultivation, with a particular focus on apple trees. Following the training courses, the individuals were provided with employment assistance and four individuals qualified to receive income generating grants, worth \$5,000 USD to help grow their business.



## Work in Sri Lanka

Since 2004, MLI has partnered with the U.S. Department of State and generous private donors to donate 26 Mine Detection Dogs to the Sri Lankan Army's Humanitarian Demining Unit (HDU). Since the end of the civil war in 2009, Sri Lanka has made tremendous progress in its mine clearance efforts. Though many of the dogs have retired, in 2014, the 11 active MDDs (*Jeckie, Lil' Swoop, Madjesty, Yankee, Baccus, Bael, Karna, Bennett, Sammy, Boris,* and *Chandi*) searched 107,116m<sup>2</sup> (26 acres) of mine-affected land.

Throughout 2014, the HDU concentrated their demining efforts around the Kudakachchikodiya and Wellamullawaikal villages in the northern half of Sri Lanka. The work of the MDDs and their handlers impacted 200 families (approximately 964 persons) who have now been able to safely return to their homes and access the land surrounding their villages.

# **Work in Yemen**

Yemen is heavily contaminated with landmines from conflicts stemming back to the 1960s. MLI has been working to help landmine survivors in Yemen since 2010, providing medical assistance, rehabilitative care, vocational training, and Mine Risk Education, while also engaging youth in the mine issue by linking schools in Yemen with

schools in the U.S. through CHAMPS. Partnering with the Yemen Executive Mine Action Center (YEMAC) and the Yemen Association for Landmine Survivors (YALS), and with funding from the U.S. Department of State, MLI built a state of the art computer center in Sana'a. Using this facility, hundreds of landmine survivors have taken computer training classes to enhance their employment opportunities. Others in the community use the facility at minimal cost to support YALS' activities.

In 2014, MLI's Survivors' Assistance programs provided vocational training and medical assistance, including prosthetic limbs, for twenty survivors. Thirteen

female survivors participated in sewing classes and received employment assistance. An additional seven survivors took English classes, and ten survivors received prosthetic limbs and rehabilitative care. As one female survivor who completed the sewing class noted, "In Sana'a, sewing for women is the best vocational job and through my social network, I could have a lot of customers. Last month, my income was between \$200 and \$250, but this month I expect the income will be double two times because of the feast season. Because of this sewing class, I will now be able to help support my family."

Through CHAMPS, children from schools in Connecticut, Maryland, and Pennsylvania held monthly video calls with youth in Sana'a. The children in Yemen helped to identify mine survivors who needed assistance, and the youth in the U.S. raised funds to help provide them with critically needed medical care.






