Who We Are

Marshall Legacy Institute (MLI) a Virginia-based İS 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization that was founded by General Gordon R. Sullivan (Ret.) in 1997 to extend the vision of Nobel Peace Prize laureate George C. Marshall and the Marshall Plan, which was designed to alleviate suffering and promote hope, growth, and stability in war-torn countries. For many nations, a primary obstacle to achieving sustainable progress is the deadly legacy of landmines and other unexploded ordnance, relics of armed conflicts that often ended long ago. Landmines cause long-lasting environmental degradation, agricultural production, impede economic growth, slow the return of refugees, instill fear, and kill and maim innocent people and animals daily.

MLI's primary mission is to establish practical, affordable, sustainable indigenous programs to help severely mine-affected countries rid their land of the horrific scourge of landmines. These efforts include the development and implementation of the Mine Detection Dog Partnership Program (MDDPP), which provides mine detection dogs (MDDs) to accelerate the pace of landmine clearance operations;

CHildren Against Mines Program (CHAMPS), which promotes global citizenship and engages American youth in service learning projects to help children living in war-torn countries; and the Survivors' Assistance program, which helps those injured by landmines acquire prostheses and attend vocational training а swift reintegration into community.

These three programs (1) educate citizens about the dangers of mines, (2) provide valuable resources for landmine clearance, especially MDDs, (3) train national leaders charged with mine-action responsibilities, and (4) assist landmine survivors with physical and psychological needs. MLI provides resources and training to help countries build their own sustainable demining programs.

Where we work

For the past 18 years, MLI has strived to assist severely mine contaminated countries by helping them help themselves. MLI is a strong advocate for affordable and sustainable programs.

By the end of 2015, MLI had:

- 1) provided 210 mine detection dogs to 11 war-torn countries and trained and certified indigenous handlers to safely employ the dog teams in national landmine clearance programs;
- 2) engaged tens of thousands of youth from America and abroad in the global landmine issue;
- 3) and provided critically needed medical assistance, prostheses, mobility devices, and vocational training to hundreds of landmine survivors.

Mine Detection Dog Partnership Program (MDDPP)

MLI's longest running program is the Mine Detection Dog Partnership Program (MDDPP). The program utilizes government and private donations to and deliver Mine purchase, train. Detection Dogs (MDDs) to indigenous demining organizations within a mineaffected country. There are currently more than 900 MDDs working in 24 countries; MLI has donated 210 of those dogs. In just the past two years, MLI's life-saving dogs have searched more than 3.6 million square meters of mine-contaminated land, saving countless lives!

MDDs are a crucial component to mine action programs because of their

incredible sense of smell, which allows them to "sniff out" the explosive odors of landmines. Unlike metal detectors, tools commonly used in demining, a dog is able to locate both metal and plastic landmines. An MDD works in a team with a human handler; the team can search up to 30 times faster than a manual deminer without compromising accuracy.

When properly integrated with other technologies (manual demining and machines) the mine detection dog team is an incredibly valuable tool for mine detection. None of MLI's Mine Detection Dogs have ever been hurt or killed while working.


MLI donated 12 MDDs in 2015. Six went to Lebanon to work with the Lebanese Mine Action Center and another six were provided to the Armenian Center for Humanitarian Demining and Expertise. Additionally, 15 MDDs from Afghanistan were transferred to work in Azerbaijan and Bosnia Herzegovina.

Active MDDs

After a lifetime of saving lives, MDDs retire to loving homes to enjoy the rest of their lives with their handler or, when that is not possible, MLI finds them loving homes in the United States.

Children Against Mines Program (CHAMPS)

In 2003, MLI's Children Against Mines Program (CHAMPS) was founded by Diana Enzi, wife of Senator Enzi (R-WY). This program promotes global unique engages citizenship and American children in the landmine issue, to which they would unlikely otherwise be exposed. MLI's CHAMPS team travels throughout the United States with our "canine ambassador," a retired Mine Detection Dog, to spark interest among the American youth in the landmine issue and inspire them to explore the problem and to become part of the solution.

Through CHAMPS, students raise funds to sponsor life-saving MDDs and help youth who have been wounded by landmines. As of December 2015, dedicated CHAMPS youth raised nearly 1 million dollars, sponsoring 36 mine detection dogs (MDDs) and helping hundreds of landmine survivors.

CHAMPS also links U.S. schools with mine-affected countries. schools in enabling kids to work together in servicelearning projects that help children who have been injured by landmines and to prevent future accidents through mine risk education. American children have conducted video-conference calls with Bosnia vouth in Afghanistan, and Herzegovina, Iraq, and Yemen.

Interethnic Reconciliation


In 2015, MLI launched a new component within CHAMPS in Bosnia and Herzegovina, which connected Bosnian students from majority Bosniak, Croat, and Serb schools to ease ethnic tensions and advance the cause of reconciliation.

CHAMPS MDDs of 2015

Four MDDs were sponsored by CHAMPS kids in Connecticut and Maryland in 2015. Once the MDDs complete training with MLI's partner Global Training Academy, located in Texas, they will commence operations in northern Iraq, Bosnia and Herzegovina, and Armenia.

Survivors' Assistance

Hundreds of thousands of people are victims of landmine accidents. and 5,000 additional approximately men, women, and children are hurt by these deadly weapons each year. MLI's Survivors' Assistance Program began as a way to implement a variety of projects to assist those who have been injured by mines. MLI provides prosthetic devices, rehabilitative treatments, and vocational training to hundreds of landmine survivors each year. MLI also provides specialized training for doctors so they are able to better treat the unique needs of mine survivors.

In 2015, landmine survivors in Lebanon received medical care and vocational training. Vocational training was provided to 63 landmine/UXO survivors or their family members in poultry production, apple and olive tree production, and beekeeping, and a portion of the graduates received small income generating grants.

In recent years, MLI has helped survivors in Afghanistan, Armenia, Azerbaijan, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Iraq, Lebanon, Vietnam, and Yemen. The survivors have received training in computers and IT, sewing, and carpentry. Many have been able to use the new skills to secure gainful employment and provide for themselves and their families.

Children who are hurt by mines have little chance of getting a prosthetic limb or even a wheelchair in countries like Afghanistan, Iraq, and Yemen. With no mobility, they are unable to attend school and lead sad and desperate lives, sequestered in their homes. MLI finds youth who are in need of care, providing them with prostheses, rehabilitative care, and hope for the future.





Afghanistan

Afghanistan's mine and UXO (unexploded ordnance) problem is the consequence of more than 30 years of war. Since 2007, MLI has donated 28 MDDs to four local Afghan demining organizations (ATC, DAFA, OMAR, and MCPA). These MDDs searched 2,370 acres of land which was returned to the Afghan people for safe and productive use.

MLI's partner organization, the Mine Detection Center (MDC) in Afghanistan, established a successful breeding & training program for MDDs. MDC's excellent work, coupled with the landmine

clearance success of the four Afghan NGOs using MLI-donated dogs, reduced most of Afghanistan's mine contaminated land that was particularly suitable for MDD operations. This resulted in a surplus of dogs. During 2015, MLI worked with the U.S. Department of State to MDDs that were repatriate 21 retirement age, and reassign additional MDDs to demining operations in other countries. MLI's partner in Texas, Mission K9 Rescue, assisted in placing the heroic dogs in loving homes in the U.S. The 15 active MDDs were transferred to work with local demining organizations Azerbaijan and Bosnia Herzegovina. They were paired with local handlers, achieved certification, resumed their lifesaving work.

Armenia

The conflict between Armenia and Azerbaijan during 1988-1994 left both countries littered by landmines and ERW. Most of affected areas are located along the border regions with Azerbaijan and in the Nagorno-Karabakh region. It is estimated that 35,000 people are directly impacted by landmines in Armenia.

The Minister of Defense of the Republic of Armenia requested MLI's assistance in 2002 to help increase the country's demining capacity. From 2002 to 2003, MLI donated 12 MDDs to Armenia through the MDDPP. During their working lifetime, these dogs were able to "sniff out" 400 acres of land and return it back to the people. However, demining efforts

have slowed during the past few years due to financial, programmatic, and other issues.

In 2015, the Deputy Minister of Defense of the Republic of Armenia requested MLI's help once again to rebuild the country's indigenous demining capacity by providing six MDDs. The renewed Mine Detection Dog Partnership Program in Armenia received funding from the U.S. Department of State and ITF Enhancing Human Security in 2015. The six MDDs will not only replace retired MDDs from 2002-2003, but will also increase the operational capacity of CHDE increase the safety and security of in and communities living contaminated areas. The MDDs are expected to commence working mid-2016.

Azerbaijan

The 1988 to 1994 conflict between Azerbaijan and Armenia and the collapse of the Soviet Union left much of Azerbaijan littered with landmines. Even precise extent though the contaminated land remains unknown due to the high concentration of landmines in Nagorno-Karabakh Autonomous Province, it is estimated that there are more than 736 km² of suspected hazardous areas throughout the rest of Azerbaijan, affecting 514,000 people. Some of the most highly contaminated regions are Fizuli and Aghstafa in southern and northwestern Azerbaijan.

The Azerbaijan National Agency for Mine Action (ANAMA) was established in 1998 and is responsible for overseeing all aspects of mine action activities in the country.

Since 2005, MLI has donated twenty nine mine detection dogs (MDDs) to ANAMA and an additional seven MDDs were transferred from Afghanistan in 2015, resulting in thirty six total MDDs donated to Azerbaijan. Currently, nineteen MDDs are actively working in the country. Almost all of the dogs were trained by the Mine Detection Dog Center (MDDC) in Bosnia and Herzegovina. In addition to Bosnia and Herzegovina and Azerbaijan, MDDs trained at the MDDC have also been deployed to work in Angola, Armenia, and Lebanon.

Other MLI MDDs that have previously worked or are currently working in Azerbaijan were trained by DANMINAR, a mine detection dog training outfitter in Denmark.

Together with their handlers, the MDDs donated by MLI to ANAMA have helped to search more than 6,100 acres of contaminated land since 2005. They worked primarily in the Fizuli, Goranboy, Agcabadi, Gazach, Gabala, and Horadiz districts.

Through CHAMPS, four MDDs Azerbaijan were sponsored by American schoolchildren.

Bosnia and Herzegovina

Bosnia and Herzegovina (BiH) remains the most mine-affected country in Europe, a remnant of the 1992-1995 conflict related to the break-up of Yugoslavia. The most heavily contaminated parts of the country include the fertile agricultural belt in the northeast, but mine contamination occurs at low density in all types of soil and vegetation across the country.

For twelve years, MLI has been working to help ease the horrific scourge of landmines in Bosnia and Herzegovina. During this period, we donated twenty nine highly trained MDDs to Bosnian nongovernmental clearance organizations

and to the Offices of Civil Protection in BiH, plus an additional four MDDs that were transferred from Afghanistan in 2015 and will finish their working career in BiH. These life-saving MDDs have searched nearly 500 acres of mineaffected land that is now safe and can now be used for building schools and roads, and for developing agriculture.

MLI launched CHAMPS in Bosnia and Herzegovina in 2007. CHAMPS students have sponsored ten of the 33 MDDs that MLI has given to Bosnian demining organizations and raised funds to help dozens of Bosnian landmine survivors who have received prosthetic limbs and other rehabilitative treatment.

Bosnia and Herzegovina: CHAMPS and interethnic reconciliation

Despite the war ending more than twenty years ago, tensions remain high between the different ethnic groups in Bosnia and Herzegovina. In 2014, MLI launched a new CHAMPS project in Bosnia and Herzegovina designed to promote interaction and friendship between youth in the three majority ethnic groups: Bosniak, Croat, and Serb. It builds on previous CHAMPS projects and is working to develop tolerance and reconciliation between the ethnically and geographically diverse communities Bosnia and Herzegovina. Through the program, not only are American students linked with Bosnian students, but children

from different ethnic groups within Bosnia and Herzegovina are connected and work together to help promote interethnic reconciliation. Children attending a school in an area that is majority Bosniak work with children living in other regions of the country that are majority Serb and Croat. The youth communicate on a regular basis via video messenger and are working together on service projects to help mine survivors in their communities. Three schools in Bosnia and 6 American schools were linked through the project during the 2015/2016 school year and an additional nine schools will be linked during the 2016/2017 school year.

In February 2015, the first of several weekend workshops was held, which brought together the CHAMPS leaders from each of the three Bosnian schools so they could meet each other in person and participate in activities that built trust and friendship.

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Throughout the remainder of 2015. CHAMPS children continued working together to identify and assist landmine survivors who received medical assistance and prosthetics through funds raised by American youth. Bosnian CHAMPS children also visited the homes of landmine survivors, such as that of Marinko Tomic in Kreševo, who lost his leg in a mine explosion in 2003. Mr. Tomic is one of five mine survivors to receive a prosthetic limb through this project. During the visit, the children got to know Mr. Tomic, helped him in his garden and around the house, and after the visit, met with Kreševo city officials to brainstorm ideas for a city beautification project they might do together in the future.

The CHAMPS students also helped to

deliver mine risk education to three mineaffected communities, impacting nearly 1,000 people.

In 2016, additional Bosnian schools will join the program. MLI also plans to expand this successful program to other post-conflict countries around the world in future years.



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Iraq: central and southern

Iraq is contaminated with landmines and unexploded ordnance (UXO) as a result of multiple conflicts spanning more than 30 years. Mines and UXO contaminate an estimated 1,604 square kilometers of the country, directly impacting the lives of 1.6 million Iraqi citizens. Iraq is widely considered to be among the most minecontaminated countries in the world.

Since 2010, MLI has donated 12 MDDs and provided advanced training to Iraq Mine and UXO Clearance Organization (IMCO) in Central and Southern Iraq. These MDD teams operated in the Basra region where they helped to accelerate

the pace of landmine clearance operations by searching 67 acres of land. MLI continued the capacity building program during 2015, providing additional training for IMCO, local MDD handlers, and veterinarians.

MLI's CHAMPS program was launched in Iraq in 2010 and seven of the MDDs donated to IMCO were sponsored through CHAMPS campaigns. CHAMPS kids in Iraq and the U.S. have worked together to provide rehabilitative care and prostheses to dozens of young mine survivors, and have also enabled survivors to receive vocational training. CHAMPS youth in Iraq have received extensive mine risk education, which they have shared with others, impacting thousands of lives.

Iraq: Kurdistan

Iragi Kurdistan is contaminated millions of landmines and UXO that were placed by the former Iraqi government over the past 40 years and the Iranian Army during the Iran-Iraq War from 1980 to 1988. There are an estimated 314 million square meters (121 square miles) of contaminated land across Iraqi Kurdistan. The ongoing regional crisis and the rise of the Islamic State (IS) have also impacted local demining seriously operations and high amounts explosives have been found in areas liberated from IS.

With funding from the U.S. Department of State and private donors, in 2009 MLI built a 6 Mine Detection Dog capacity in Kurdistan. These six MDDs were paired with handlers and have spent the past seven years searching for mines with the

Mines Advisory Group (MAG). The dog teams have searched over 500 acres throughout Kurdistan, saving lives and allowing thousands of residents in Kirkuk, Suliminiyah, and Chamchamal to return to their homes and safely use the land - a much needed step towards economic revival and stability!



Lebanon

Lebanon's 15-year civil war and the multiple conflicts with Israel have left

the country littered with landmines. The 2006 conflict between Israel and Lebanon further contaminated southern Lebanon with landmines, cluster munitions, and other unexploded ordnance (UXO).

In Lebanon, the Lebanese Mine Action Center (LMAC) within the Lebanese Armed Forces (LAF) is responsible for executing and coordinating the Lebanese National Mine Action Program. LMAC has been a significant partner of MLI's since 2001, when MLI helped to establish LMAC's

Mine Detection Dog (MDD) capacity with the donation and training of 6 MDDs.

MLI has donated a total of thirty two MDDs to LMAC to accelerate humanitarian demining operations. These valuable animals have been working with their Lebanese handlers to assist in mine clearance in high- and medium-impacted areas and have helped to search 180 acres of contaminated land. One of these MDDs, Joan, and her handler, Ahmad Soleh, won MLI's "MDD Team of the Year" award in 2015, which they were presented with at MLI's annual Clearing the Path Gala in October.

Since the establishment of MLI's CHAMPS program in Lebanon in 2009, five MDDs have been sponsored by American schoolchildren.



Lebanon: Survivors' Assistance

During 2014 and 2015, in collaboration with the U.S. Department of State and with support from private American donors, MLI implemented survivors' assistance programs in Lebanon to provide medical assistance and vocational training to Lebanese landmine/UXO survivors.

During 2015, MLI provided vocational training to 63 survivors, training them in beekeeping, poultry production, and apple and olive tree production. An additional 45 survivors received medical assistance and rehabilitative care and 45 additional survivors were fitted for new prosthetics,

to be received in 2016.

Vocational training workshops in poultry production and apple production were held by two experts identified by MLI in 2014 and training was expanded in 2015 to beekeeping and poultry production, as well. Two-thirds of the participants were landmine survivors and the rest were family members of survivors. Training consisted of thematic content, a business feasibility study, and start-up training. Following the trainings, 14 participants received small income-generating grants based on the high quality of project proposals they submitted.





Three decades of civil

war between the Sri Lankan Government and the Liberation Tigers of Tamil Eelam (LTTE) left the Jaffna peninsula and northern Sri Lanka littered with landmines and UXO. Major violence ended in 2009, after a surge in fighting that followed the 2002-2006 cease fire. Contamination posed a major obstacle to resettlement of nearly 300,000 people who were displaced by the conflict, and also to the economic and social rehabilitation of the north

MLI commenced its partnership with Sri Lanka in 2004 upon request of the Sri Lankan Government and provided thirteen MDDs to the Sri Lankan Army Engineer Regiment's Humanitarian Demining Unit (SLA HDU). The MDDs were sponsored by private, caring donors and were paired and trained with local Sri Lankan handlers to safely and efficiently search for landmines.

In 2011 and 2012, MLI donated thirteen additional MDDs to the HDU to replace retiring dogs. Four of the MDDs were sponsored through MLI's CHAMPS program. All of the twenty six lifesaving dogs donated by MLI to Sri Lanka since 2004 have been making valuable contributions to Sri Lanka's demining efforts with their handlers. These MDD teams have searched over 95 acres of land since 2004.

Yemen is contaminated with mines and explosive remnants of war (ERW) as a result of a series of armed conflicts dating back five decades. Inhabitants of border areas between northern and southern Yemen are especially susceptible to the dangers of landmines.

MLI commenced its partnership with Association for Landmine Yemen's Survivors (YALS) in 2010 to help survivors reintegrate into society by learning computer skills that help them find employment and gain confidence. CHAMPS in Yemen was launched in 2011 through which hundreds of survivors have received medical assistance, rehabilitation training, and vocational skills training, providing them with

opportunities to improve their social and economic wellbeing.

During 2015, U.S. schools continued their active participation in the CHAMPS program by connecting with Yemeni children at the 22 May School in Sana'a. Through the CHAMPS Yemen program, landmine survivors received prosthetics and medical assistance, and additional ten female received vocational training in sewing. In 2016, twenty more survivors participate in vocational training and receive medical assistance.

At the end of 2015, MLI also provided an MDD Advisor to assist the Yemen Executive Mine Action Center in the development of Standard Operating Procedures for its Mine Detection Dog Detachment.


